
Introduction






Advanced searching within HLQ

Make sure you select 'Huntington Library Quarterly' from the list given so you only get articles from this journal. Otherwise, you will see a range of content which you may or may not have access to.






Now think of keywords relevant to the topic you want to find articles on and search:



Remember, you can search within a number of different fields and combine terms in different ways:







MyMUSE Library

Creating a MyMUSE Library account will allow you to save articles and searches to your personal account set up journal alerts. Click 'Menu' and 'Log In / Sign Up':



Scroll down to complete the form if you have not signed up before:






Once you are logged in click on 'Save' under an article and it will save the article to your MyMUSE Library:




Clicking on 'MyMUSE Library' on the left of the screen or in the Menu will let you see all saved articles.




You can cite items, delete some or all saved items from MyMUSE Library.


Clicking on 'Menu' and 'Search History' will bring up all that you have searched for while logged in. You can choose to delete some, or all, of the searches:








To create a journal alert so you are emailed each time a new journal issue is released, go into the main record for the journal and click '+MUSE Alert.'



You will be redirected to another page where you can select how (by email etc.) and how often you are contacted when a new journal issue is released:





Clicking 'Add This Alert' will save the alert.

Any Alerts you have set can be seen and edited under 'MyMUSE Alerts.'


Click on 'Logout' when you have finished using the platform.


When using a computer or laptop in Union Theological College, with 'cookies' turned on, click <u>Scottish</u> <u>Journal of Theology</u> to go to the journal homepage.

Browse content by clicking on the relevant 'Volume' and 'Issue.' Anything you have access to will be shown with this.







You can search within all Cambridge all University Press journals <u>here</u>, using the 'Search journals' bar, however, you will not have access to all the content. You can refine your results on the left of the page, e.g. 'Only show content I have access to.'



Click 'View abstract' to read an overview of the article. (Not always available). Click 'PDF' to open the article as a PDF in another tab. Click 'HTML' to open a webpage in another tab with the article on it. Clicking on the title of the article will do the same thing.









If you 'Register' here you can save your searches and create alerts.



Click 'Save search' after doing a search which you want to come back to again.



Click 'My account' then 'My searches' on the right of the screen to return to saved searches.





From there you can: re-run the search; edit the name of the search and permanently delete the search.



You can create an alert so you are emailed each time a new issue of this journal is released.



A table of contents for the new journal issue will be emailed to you. You will also be emailed when newly published articles are released.







If you click on an issue, the contents of the issue will appear on the webpage:





To read an article's abstract, references, or the full article, just click the relevant link under the title (PDF and EPUB links download the article in PDF or EPUB formats):



Clicking the title of the article allows you to read it online as well as giving a range of other options:










Simple and advanced searching within Reformation & Renaissance Review


The simple search box is usually displayed across the top of the webpage:




Enter keywords, author surnames, etc., and click on the magnifying glass. For example:






Refine results on the left of the screen – only articles (not book reviews etc.) and 'baptism' in the title:



Click on 'Advanced search' under the simple search box to carry out more precise searches.



Search within different fields – you can select the field from the dropdown menu.


Add (+) or take away (x) search boxes.

Keywords can be combined with AND, OR, NOT. Just type these between your keywords in the search boxes.

Choose articles published in the last month / 6 months / year, or give your own date range.


The citation search allows you to enter the citation of an article you are looking for.


For example, I searched for Calvin AND reformation in the title:






This search can then be refined on the left of the screen.

You can save searches if you create your own account. Click on 'Save this search' under 'Search results.' Name your search. You can also set up alerts, on the same dialogue box, to be emailed when more articles are added to the platform which would have been returned in your original search.





To make your own account click on 'Register' on the top right of the screen and complete the form:



Once logged in you can see your saved searches by clicking on 'Account settings.'



You can set up a new content alert to be emailed when a new issue of *Reformation & Renaissance Review* is released online:



You will be redirected to a page where you can manage the frequency of your alerts and delete them:

Manage alerts

Sign up to our email alerts to keep up to date with the things that are important to you.

New content alerts are sent when a new complete issue of your chosen journal (s) is available online.

Latest article alerts are sent when new individual articles from your chosen journal(s) are available online. These alerts are sent on a weekly basis by default, you can change their frequency using the right-hand dropdown options below.

You can add new journals to the above alerts quickly and easily by clicking the *New content alerts* button below the search bar on any journal homepage on Taylor & Francis Online.

Citation alerts are sent whenever a record that you have chosen has been cited. Set up citation alerts by navigating to the Citations tab on your chosen article, and clicking the Subscribe to citation updates button.



When you click on Delete button, you will unsubscribe from new content alerts for this journal (both new issue and latest article notifications).


In Job 29:9, the Septuagint and its ancient revisions diverge slightly from the Masoretic Text: instead of putting their hands over their mouths when Job appears on the city square, the notables use their fingers. 


Revue Biblique is available on ATLASerials PLUS. All articles are indexed and the full text is available from volume 24 (1915) to five years behind the current issue.





Simple and Advanced Searching within Scottish Church History

To use the simple search just type keywords into the box at the top of the webpage:



Search Tips

Boolean searches

You can use the Boolean Operators AND, OR and NOT within search fields. By default an AND relationship is assumed between search terms unless another operator is specified.

Searching for authors

To search for multiple authors, separate each author name with either AND or OR. Using AND will search for content that has been co-authored by the authors. Using OR will search for content that has been authored by either of the authors.

Searching for phrases


Enclose your search term with quotation marks to search for an exact match of that phrase. Without quotation marks, articles including all of the search terms somewhere in the article will be listed. For example searching for "civil war" will find articles containing that exact phrase.

Wildcards

Use a question mark (?) in a search term to represent any one character and use an asterisk (*) to represent zero or more characters. For example, searching for Europe* will find results containing Europe and European. Wildcards cannot be used at the start of a search term or when searching for phrases in quotes.




Refine results on the right of the screen – I have selected results published in Scottish Church History:






You can use phrase searching by putting a phrase within double quotation marks, e.g. "Scottish Reformation". Combine terms using AND, OR and NOT. If you enter two terms, AND will automatically be assumed.









Click 'Register' in the top right to create your own account. Having your own account will allow you to save searches and create search and journal alerts.

Complete the form. Use the verification code which will be emailed to you to complete registration.





Click the magnifying glass to save a search and create an alert for it. You can choose how often you are emailed regarding new articles which would have been returned in your search:



You can edit the search and how often you are contacted concerning the results.







Simple and advanced searching within The Journal of Theological Studies

The simple search is in the ribbon at the top. Enter keywords and click the magnifying glass or enter on your keyboard to search.



The dropdown menu automatically chooses to search within *The Journal of Theological Studies* only if that is where you have been browsing. The dropdown menu gives a range of options for where you can search:



You can choose to search within all Oxford Academic journals, but you will not have access to the full text of all journals returned in your searches.

Carry out an advanced search through all of *The Journal of Theological Studies* by:

1. Click on 'Advanced search' or here.





2. Type in the keywords you wish to search for on the left. The dropdown menu under the search box allows you to select which field you want to search within (e.g. all, authors/editors, full text, keywords, references/bibliographies, title):





- 3. Further limits can be specified under the search boxes 'Type' of article and 'Publication date' are probably most useful:
- 4. Click 'Update' to run the search.
- 5. You can further modify your search on the left of the screen, should you wish to.







Create your own account within *The Journal of Theological Studies* to create alerts and save searches


Create your own account by clicking on the head icon in the top right and 'Register.' Complete the form.
