


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
Gamble Guides

To access eBooks:

1. **Login** via the **link** and **User ID**. **Ask library staff** for further details if you do not yet have these.
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3. Select **'eBook Collection (EBSCOhost)'** and click **'OK.'** **'ATLA Religion Database with ATLASerials'** and **'Audiobook Collection (EBSCOhost)'** can be unselected if you just want to see eBooks.



4. **Search for a specific eBook.** For example:

ABSTRACT

The Reformation of the sixteenth century took various forms and exhibited numerous emphases in the places in which it took root. While the work of Luther in Germany was foundational to all that happened, the Reformations in Switzerland, Geneva, England, and Scotland were each given unique shape as Protestantism established itself in different social, economic, and political circumstances. Certain themes remained constant, such as the need for the church to be regulated by Scripture, but considerable diversity emerged on matters of the sacraments, church

The text reads: 'In his broader theology, Zwingli's stress was on God rather than man, so in his Christology, it was on Christ as God. As a result, whereas Luther emphatically asserted the unity of Christ's person, Zwingli distinguished sharply between the two natures. This led Luther to accuse him of holding that a mere man had died for us.³¹ This sharp distinction—almost separation—between the natures is clear in Zwingli's *Commentary on True and False Religion* (1525). There he wrote that Christ is our salvation according to his divine nature, not according to his humanity.³² So in John 6 he referred the flesh and blood simply to the gospel, the eating and drinking to faith: "This, then, is the third sure mark that Christ is not speaking here of sacramental eating; for He is only in so far salvation unto us as He was slain for us; but He could be slain only according to the flesh and could be salvation bringing only according to his divinity."³³ Much of this section is devoted to establishing that John 6 does not refer to sacramental eating, but in doing so, Zwingli came close to the Nestorian separation of the natures.³⁴ It follows that he regarded the phrase "this is my body" to mean "this signifies the body."³⁵ In the Eucharistic debate with Luther, Zwingli so stressed the distinction of the two natures—while holding to unity of the person—that Luther accused him of Nestorianism.³⁶ On the *communicatio idiomatum*, Zwingli argued that there is attributed to one of the natures what is accomplished by the other. This is a figure of speech on the basis

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
