



Where to access the ODNB

The ODNB can be accessed in the 'Student Resources'/'Library Resources' section of the VLE or in the 'Digital Resources from the Gamble Library' section of each shell:







You can also access the ODNB using the PDF Gamble Guide listing all electronic resources which is emailed out by the Librarian.


Once you click on the 'Oxford DNB' icon you will be prompted to enter your Union Theological College email address and password. You will then be redirected to the ODNB landing page.

The ODNB holds over 60,000 biographies and 11,000 portraits of influential people who shaped British history. Each January new individuals who passed away four years ago or more are added. The ODNB is updated monthly by academics at Oxford University.

Simple search

You can search the ODNB by typing in names ('Article titles') in the search box and clicking the magnifying glass or pressing enter on your keyboard:





Results can then be refined on the left. For example, you can choose to see just articles rather than articles and images in your results. You can enter the date range they may be from.



DOI (digital object identifier) is listed and can be used and shared as a permanent link to the article.

Details of when the article was published and a link to the previous version are given.

The article's contents are on the left of the screen and you can click the heading you want to go directly to its content.

'Sources' give the list of references consulted to write the article and so are very useful.

'Likenesses' list the portraits, engravings etc. of the individual which are available.

'External resources' give links to other websites which give information on the individual.

'Abbreviations' link to all abbreviations used in the ODNB.

These icons allow you to:

- -Download the article PDF
- -Save the article to your personal profile. (See page 7 for how to create a personal profile)
- -Generate the article's citation (NB this is different to the College's referencing system so use with caution)
- -Email the content to someone or copy a link to the article. (Only College staff and students will have access to the article's full text).

Advanced search

The advanced search can be accessed by clicking on the link beside the simple search box:





If you have already done a simple search the advanced search options will be listed on the left of the webpage. The advanced search will allow you to search within a range of fields, not just the article title. For example, you can search for all articles on male ministers who were around from 1600 to 1700 in Ireland:




You can also search by 'Life event' - the date and/or location of that event.

It is also possible to browse the ODNB by 'Occupation' and 'Religious affiliation' by selecting the relevant heading from the ribbon at the top of the screen:



These can be further refined on the left of the screen.

Other useful tools and resources

Under 'Tools and Resources' 'Free ODNB' there are a range of useful free lists that could be helpful in research.



For example, 'Local lives' has a Northern Ireland Lives' section which lists 2,000 notable people with links to the Province.
